

## Quilted Post Cards, Chris Gordon



Quilted Postcards are fun to make. You can try new patterns, techniques and color combinations without committing to a large project. You can use little scraps of your favorite fabrics and trim. Best of all, they go through the US Mail with a first class stamp. There are many ways to create these miniature works of art. Each postcard you produce will give you ideas for new ones. This class will use the theme of Memorial Day, thanking service personnel, and patriotism.

### Supply List

Sewing Machine, #90 needle and #100 used with #12 thread for covering the edge

Thread: regular thread, rayon, #12 thread with a matching bobbin thread 60 wt.

Ruler, Rotary Cutter and Mat

Pellon Peltex R 70 This is fusible on both sides, Alternative, cereal box cardboard cut 4" by 6" bring 3

Small pieces of thin light weight batting 4 1/2 by 6 1/2 bring at least 3

Wonder Under or other iron on product you like

Glue Stick and Elmers School Glue

If you will be machine quilting the card, I like a stabilizer under the batting. I use a tear away or machine embroidery product

Iron and press sheet for fusible material

Extra feet for machine such as walking foot, open toed embroidery foot, free motion foot or darning foot

Novelty prints, ex Patriotism, America, fabrics with words you might use,

Fabrics for Eagle from Snippet Sensations by Cindy Walter

Eagle: sky fabric, hills, dark, med, light, black, white, grays; dark, blue, med gray, light gray, and canary yellow

Optional: bring a paper pieced project that could fit a 4 by 6 format. netting and /or tulle, rubber stamps/stamp pad, fabric markers, pigma pens
